Congratulations! You are through to the second and final stage of our audition process, which will take place online. We will aim to replicate the in-person recall experience as closely as possible.

If you live outside of the UK, we have automatically invited you to a live online recall. If you would prefer to attend one of our in-person recall events either at LIPA (from December 2025 through to April 2026), or planned in either the USA (New York City, January 2026 or Chicago, February 2026), Norway (March 2026) or Hong Kong (April 2026) please email international@lipa.ac.uk

We understand auditions can be very nerve wracking, so please read these guidelines carefully. Remember we want to get to know about you as an individual, so please try to relax, be yourself and enjoy the recall.

Quick Checklist

- ✓ Bring all three prepared pieces
- ✓ Wear comfortable clothing
- ✓ Check your internet connection, webcam and mic. Locate yourself in a quiet and comfortable room where you will not be disturbed.
- ✓ Familiarise yourself with our programmes so you can discuss them in the interview

Guidelines for your Stage Two live, online recall

Our online recalls will take place on Microsoft Teams. You will be allocated an interview time and date, typically with a minimum of two weeks' notice. Times are GMT or BST as appropriate. You will receive the joining link approximately 24 hours prior to the interview. The recall will typically last around 30 minutes and will consist of your Stage One monologues, one new exercise and a short interview:

Your Stage One monologues

Be prepared to deliver any of the monologues you submitted for your Stage One audition. You may be asked to work with one, two or all three speeches, so please be ready with all of them.

If you have since worked on a different speech and want to use that in our audition, you are welcome to do so but it is not expected of you. You should have:

1. Contemporary monologue (no longer than two minutes)

We are interested in your ability to imagine yourself in the character's shoes and engage freely with the character and the world they live in.

2. Verse speech (no longer than two minutes)

We are interested in your ability to work imaginatively with poetic and heightened forms of speech and to communicate images and stories in a truthful way.

3. Self-created piece (no longer than two minutes)

This is an opportunity to highlight your individuality and show us who you are.

Remember you may not work on all your speeches in Stage Two, but we will have already seen them in Stage One.

Exercise 1: Duologue piece

In this session, you will work on a short piece of dialogue, which is attached to this email. You can choose whether to read as character A or B and select piece 1, 2, 3 or 4. You will have the opportunity to work with either a current student or a member of staff. You are not expected to be off book, but you should be familiar with the lines so that you can easily take your eye off the page. You should think about what motivates the character, what makes them say what they say and be ready to try these ideas out in the room. We will be looking at your ability to make choices and to let go of choices in favour of other ideas. We are interested in your response to direction and your capacity to absorb notes.

Interview

You will have a short, informal conversation with a member of the panel about your aspirations, experience and suitability for our training. Please prepare by looking at our range of programmes on our website. This is also your chance to ask us questions.

This completes all stages of your LIPA audition.
